The tool kit has been rolled out at several recent conferences including the Wisconsin Head Start Association Conference, The Preserving Early Childhood Conference and The Fulfilling The Promise conference. Over 100 books were distributed at these venues.

# New Feature Practical Strategies

Strategy

Upon identification and enrollment of a new family, developmental screening of the children should be a top priority. Due to the high incidence of developmental delays displayed in children who have experienced homelessness it is critical that screenings take place as soon as possible. In this way referrals to appropriate services can be made quickly and children can receive the services they need and are entitled to such as Birth to 3 - Early Interventions Services or your School District's Special Education Program for children 3 to 5 years of age.

New Resource from School House Connection: Childproofing Checklist for Housing and Homeless Service Providers

The "Ten 'S's for Safety" can be used to guide discussions, establish policies and practices, to "child-proof" housing and homeless services and settings. The tool can be used to strengthen collaborations between housing and children's service community providers so that skills, resources, and services are shared across sectors. In addition, this tool can be used to assess needs and gauge progress over time toward achieving safe and "child-proofed" housing practices.


